KU VC urges active involvement of students in proenvironment campaigns

Leads plantation drive on campus, calls for collaborative efforts to address environmental challenges



Srinagar, Mar 10: Vice-Chancellor of University of Kashmir Prof Talat Ahmad Wednesday urged students to be at the forefront of environment protection campaigns for better outcomes and greater impact on the ground.

Principal Chief Conservator of Forests J&K Dr Mohit Gera, who was a guest of honour, said his department is working seriously to increase the green cover of the J&K UT.

"We want all our stakeholders to help us realise this goal. It is our desire to not only plant conifer tree saplings, but saplings of traditional and heritage trees as well. Our target was to plant one crore trees across the UT and we are close to achieving it," he said, congratulating Kashmir University for organising the plantation drive.

KU Registrar Dr Nisar Ahmad Mir said the university is taking the plantation drive to its off-site campuses at Anantnag, Baramulla and Kupwara as well as to the Zakura Campus.

KU celebrates World Environment Day

Students, youth have to be active partners in environment protection initiatives: Prof Talat

Srinagar, June 5: The University of Kashmir on Saturday organised an online seminar to mark the World Environment Day.

Vice-Chancellor Prof Talat Ahmad inaugurated the seminar titled 'Conserving and Restoring Ecosystems', organised by the varsity's Department of Environmental Studies.

In his presidential address, Prof Talat said the Himalayan region is facing multiple challenges on the environment protection front and everyone will have to join hands



to ensure that all pro-environment campaigns and initiatives yield better results on the ground.

Prof Talat referred to several pressing environmental challenges including climate change and global warming, asserting that community-level engagement is important to raise awareness on how the adverse fallout of such environmental changes can be minimised locally.

He said students and youth will have to be active partners in environment protection and lead all environment campaigns from the front.

Prof A R Yusuf, former Dean Academic Affairs at KU, talked about ecosystem restoration and highlighted the issues and problems that Jammu and Kashmir is facing vis-à-vis conserving and managing ecosystems.

Prof Bashir Ahmad Ganai gave a historical perspective of the World Environment Day and highlighted the role of science in restoring ecosystems.

Prof G A Bhat talked about the loopholes in the policy-making vis-à-vis restoration of the environment while Prof Azra Nahid Kamili talked about the ecosystem restoration which, she said, is the main theme of World Environment Day-2021.

In his welcome address, Prof Fayaz Ahmad, Seminar Director and Head, Department of Environmental Science referred to human- animal conflict as a result of ecosystem destruction.

3-day national conference on 'global environmental challenges' begins at KU

VCs, academics, scientists, J&K UT officer share dais at inaugural session







Srinagar, June 5: A three-day national conference on 'Changing Course in Global Environment: Challenges and Solutions' started at the University of Kashmir on Monday, with Vice-Chancellors of several universities in J&K and academics from reputed institutions in the country in attendance for the inaugural and technical deliberations.

KU Vice-Chancellor Prof Nilofer Khan chaired the opening session of the conference, organised by the varsity's Department of Environmental Sciences in collaboration with Zoological Society of India (ZSI), to mark the World Environment Day and 34th All India Congress of Zoology. In his special address, Prof B N Panday urged young students to understand the origin of the environment and help stop what he called the "ecocide which is threatening plant and animal life on planet Earth."

Prof Umesh Rai called for dismantling the boundaries of academic disciplines in J&K universities to address the "new environmental challenges in a transdisciplinary manner", while Prof Bechan Lal said that young students need to shoulder the responsibility of environment protection, saying there are fears that 40% of food supply will get curtailed due to global warming and climate change in next 40 years.

Mr Saurabh Bhagat, IAS, said the J&K's Science and Technology Department has earmarked Rs five crore for research and development (R&D) on waste-to-energy research and solutions and urged the students and faculty from universities to come up with project proposals in this regard and "share their knowledge and research with the government for policy-making."

Prof Vijay Lakaskhmi said sustainable development is possible only with "harmonisation of societies with the environment".

Dr Nisar A Mir delivered the introductory remarks and highlighted the proenvironment initiatives taken by the University, while Prof Fayaz Ahmad in his welcome address said delegates from 20 institutions in the country are participating in the conference. Prof Kamal Jaiswal spelt out the programme schedule for technical deliberations.

The ZSI also honoured scientists from different parts of the country with felicitation medals for their outstanding contributions in research and academics.

'Energy Efficient Economy': Green construction, resilient infra essential for Kashmir's environ'al challenges: KU VC

Varsity organises seminar on smart structures, sustainable energy solutions



Srinagar, Oct 10: To address the need for aligning academic efforts with societal and environmental requirements while focusing on smart structures, energy optimisation and sustainable infrastructure, the University of Kashmir organised a seminar here.

The day-long event titled 'Smart Structures: Energy Efficient Economy – JK 2024' was organised by the Institute of Technology, KU, in collaboration with the National Institute of Technology (NIT) Srinagar and the North Campus, University of Kashmir.

On the occasion, KU Vice Chancellor Prof Nilofer Khan emphasised the urgent need to transition towards sustainable energy solutions, especially given Kashmir's vulnerability to earthquakes due to its seismic zone location.

"It is crucial for the university to understand the needs of our society and environment and implement the recommendations of this workshop in letter and spirit," she said, calling for a swift adoption of green construction practices.

Dean, Academic Affairs, KU, Prof Shariefudin Pirzada, asserted that it is both timely and essential to promote innovation in construction practices.

"The construction industry must shift from traditional methods and embrace newer, smarter designs that consider local climate and energy efficiency," he stated.

Dean, Academic Affairs, NIT Srinagar, Dr M Shafi Mir, raised awareness about the fact that people spend around 90% of their lives in structures that are neither sustainable nor smart.

"We need to construct buildings that prioritise environmental considerations and renewable resources, alongside encouraging a culture of recycling materials," he urged.

KU Registrar, Prof Naseer Iqbal, underscored the role of academic institutions in advocating for sustainable living.

"The recommendations from this seminar should be communicated to the government, and all new structures on our campus must adhere to the principles discussed here," he added.

Dean, School of Engineering, KU, Dr Syed Muzaffar Ali Andrabi, highlighted the importance of designing homes that are suitable for Kashmir's unique climatic conditions.

"Constructing buildings without considering local environments often leads to unnecessary resource wastage," he noted, adding that these design choices could have long-term impacts on energy use.

Director, North Campus, KU, Dr Sheikh Ghulam Mohammad, pointed out the safety concerns of existing structures.

"There is a pressing need for a new generation of builders who can construct smart, self-sufficient buildings that can withstand natural disasters while also being energy-efficient," he said.

Director, Institute of Technology, KU, Prof M Tariq Banday, reaffirmed the institution's commitment to providing cutting-edge education in line with modern demands.

"KU has launched new courses, including a programme in Artificial Intelligence, as part of our efforts to equip students with the best resources and education," he informed.

The seminar concluded with discussions on strategies to promote smart and sustainable building solutions in the region.

In her welcome address, Head, Department of English, Prof Lily Want said that the seminar aims to "create an interdisciplinary platform for leading academics and scholars to present and discuss the most recent trends, research results, experiences, concerns, practical challenges and various nuances of the theme."

She hoped that the seminar would not only facilitate exchange of views among scholars, but also help initiate policy-oriented debates and discussions.

Keynote speaker Prof Fakrul Alam, pro-vice chancellor East West University Dhaka Bangladesh, spoke at length on the topic titled "doing environmental criticism from where we are."

He traced the issues concerning environmental degradation in the city of Dhaka, eventually dwelling deep into how famed writers and scholars have addressed the subject of ecological criticism.

"Carson and Marx were truly pioneers, for it took at least two more decades, and more awareness on the part of intellectuals across humanities and social science disciplines as well as scientists, to realise the full and continuing extent of the unwanted changes mankind was inflicting on the environment year after year through mindless industrialisation, unplanned expansion and aggressing mining of the earth's resources. By the 1908s environmental criticism, or eco-criticism, or if you want to be even more au courant, Green Cultural Studies, had gathered a lot of momentum in the English departments in the West. And how could we, in our part of the world lag behind on such an issue," Alam said.

Author and environmental activist Dr Vandana Shiva, who was the guest of honour, also spoke on the theme of the seminar which, among others, was attended by Dean Academic Affairs Prof MA Sahaf, Dean Research Prof Zafar A Reshi, Registrar Prof Khursheed A Butt, Dean School of Arts, Languages and Literatures Prof Zohra Afzal and former HoD English Prof Mohammad Aslam.

Coordinator of the seminar Dr. Sami Ullah Bhat, Senior Assistant Professor, Department of Environmental Science offered vote of thanks while as Dr. Arshid Jehangir, organising Secretary of the Seminar conducted the proceeding of the seminar.

Students, research scholars and few faculty members displayed their creativity, art, skill and research ideas through poster presentation on the theme Dynamics in Nature - Issues, Challenges and Opportunities Arising out of COVID-19 Pandemic.

The three best poster presentations were awarded with certificates of merit besides a certificate of participation.

The first position was awarded to Ms. Salma Yousuf from University of Kashmir while as Mr. Arshid Ramzan and Mr. Sahil Bhat again from KU bagged Second position . The third position was shared by Mr. Jawahr Rasool from KU and Mr. Shah Khalid Ahmad from Cluster University, Srinagar.

There were four experts who delivered the talks on various burning and pressing issues like Mountain ecosystems and climate change, Contemporary environmental issues of societal importance in Kashmir like Air pollution, Massive land system changes, wetland degradation, Biodiversity conservation and ecosystem degradation, COVID-19- a pandemic of mistreated nature, Cities and Climate change.

The experts include David James Molden Director General, International Centre for Integrated Mountain Development (IC-MOD): Kathmandu, Nepal, Prof. Shakil Ahmad Romshoo, Dean Research, University of Kashmir, Srinagar Prof. P.K. Joshi, School of Environmental Sciences, JNU New Delhi, Prof Arun Kansal, Head Coca Cola Department of Regional Water Studies, TERI School of Advanced Studies, New Delhi.

The technical session started with the lead lecture of . Dr. David James Molden Director General, International Centre for Integrated Mountain Development (ICMOD): Kathmandu, Nepal who delivered his talk on Hindu Kush Himalaya (HKH) mountains, climate change, and nature based solutions. Dr. David Molden in his lecture suggested that Mountain issues need strong research backing that are relevant for policy and practice, and well communicated to policy makers who may not know mountain issues.

"Climate change and sustainable mountain development are issues of urgent important both for mountain people and for all of Asia and the world. This is because mountains are a tremendous natural resource base that provide livelihoods and economies for millions of people. They are the pulse of the planet," said Dr Molden.

Prof. Shakil Ahmad Romshoo threw light in a detailed manner on issues like air quality, climate change, melting cryosphere, depleting stream flows, land system changes, wetlands and water bodies. He strongly advocated the participation of researchers from various disciplines in order the plug the research and knowledge gaps while taking research problems of highest societal relevance.

Major emphasis from the lecture of Prof. P.K. Joshi include a) Emphasis and expansion of programs like Nagar Van (Urban/City forests) is desired and required. These should be carried out the principles of ecological/ecosystem restoration. The team should have professional (trained) ecologists as an essential member. (b) Interaction of humans or livestock with wildlife needs to restricted and checked so as to ensure least exposure to the risk of spillover of potential pathogens. The drivers of zoonotic disease emergence are changes in the environment—usually the result of human activities, ranging from land use change to changing climate, including deforestation and agricultural expansion. These need to be looked with higher degree of seriousness. (c) Ecosystem integrity is must and it underlines human health and development. All ecosystem (terrestrial and aquatic) should be taken with high degree of integrity to all development programs. (d) Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) need to be taken in consideration while framing and executing any development programs and/or while executing any intervention to any system. (e) The above can be ensured with regular training and development of youth and professional across the spectrum. The available options/tools should be exploited to maximum extent to ensure this.

Key takeaways from the lecture of Prof. Arun Kansal include that Urbanization is a dominant trend,-Successful adaptation to climate change centrally depends on urbanization process, Cities are complex open systems with linkages to hinterlands across multiple scales, -Spatial planning can influence resource use, -Governance of mitigation in settlements benefits from poly-centric and multi-level governance approach, Urban settlements are faced with multiple sustainability challenges and thus mitigation strategies must address multiple agendas.

There were at least 100 participants and 75 having poster presentations from various departments of University of Kashmir like Environmental Science, CORD, Zoology, Botany, Home Science, SRTM University Mumbai, Bharti Dasam University Tamil Nadu, GDC Shopian, Cluster University Srinagar, SKUAST-K.

Srinagar, Oct 20: Continuing to host national-level meetings related to science research and development, the University of Kashmir on Thursday hosted the DST-FIST Presentation Meeting in the areas of Earth and Atmospheric Sciences.

The Fund for Improvement of Science and Technology (FIST) is a centrally-sponsored scheme of the Department of Science and Technology Government of India that aims to provide basic infrastructure and enabling facilities for promoting research and development (R&D) in new and emerging areas and attracting fresh talent in the universities.

Addressing the opening session of the meeting that assessed the project proposals for grant of DST-FIST packages to principal investigators from different parts of the country, KU Vice-Chancellor Prof Nilofer Khan said it adds to the University's credentials and visibility to host such important scientific meetings that offer an exposure to our faculty and students on key schemes like FIST.
